Helping Hands Hawaii Awarded \$20,000 Grant from Atherton Family Foundation for Housing Support of Chronically Homeless Individuals

HONOLULU—Helping Hands Hawaii (HHH) received a \$20,000 grant from Atherton Family Foundation that will be applied to housing support for chronically homeless individuals struggling with substance use or substance use with mental illness. The grant will assist with costs incurred when applying for personal identification or rental applications as well as move-in kits once individuals find housing.

Without proper identification, such as State of Hawaii IDs or birth certificates, individuals cannot obtain rental units, benefits, healthcare services or sign up for utility accounts under their names. Rental application fees are incurred each time a client applies for housing, whether or not the client is approved, and can become increasingly expensive as it takes a client an average of four applications in order to secure housing. When a client obtains housing, move-in kits will provide them with basic necessities, such as cleaning supplies, bedding, bathroom supplies, kitchen supplies, personal toiletries and organizational tools (calendars, clocks, etc.).

The funding will be distributed through the Hawaii Pathways Project, a partnership between HHH and Catholic Charities Hawaii (CCH) and as funded by the Hawaii Department of Health's Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division through a grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. The Hawaii Pathways Project is an evidence-based Housing First initiative providing housing first, then implementing wrap-around treatment and life skill services necessary to help individuals stabilize, improve quality of life and maintain housing beyond the support of the project.
